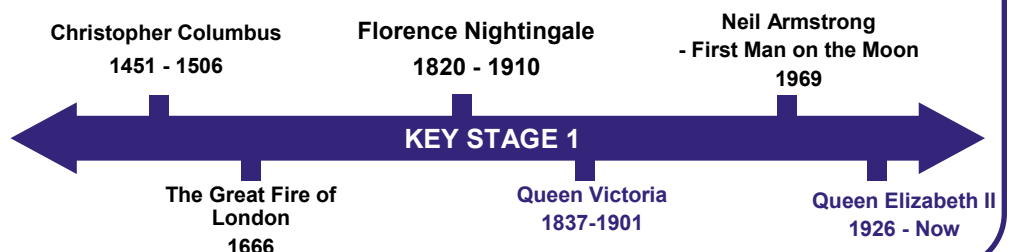

- A monarchy is a country or countries ruled by a monarch.
- Monarchies were once common throughout the world, but now they are rare.
- Our monarchy is known as the British Monarchy.
- Queen Elizabeth II is our current queen and the longest serving monarch.
- Queen Elizabeth was born on 21st April 1926, in London, with one sibling.
- Queen Victoria was born on 24th May 1819 (over 100 years apart) in London and an only child.
- QV reigned over Britain and its Empire for over 60 years.
- Queen Elizabeth is the great-great grand-daughter of Victoria.
- QV had 9 children, whereas QE has 4 children.
- QV ordered the building of Buckingham Palace.
