New Knowledge:

- There are potential risks when out in the local area with increasing independence.
- Children may feel a range of emotions and feelings when being out.
- Some people may make assumptions about others that might not reflect reality.
- When being out, some children may experience peer pressure to do things they shouldn't.
- Risky behaviour is anything that will put a person at risk of physical, mental or emotional harm or abuse. (drugs, alcohol, anti-social or criminal behaviour, hate crime, risky sexual behaviour).
- There are risks and consequences to risky behaviour.

- There are consequences to anti-social behaviour (including gangs and gang related behaviour) - the law.
