### Year 6

# Geography



All children – regardless of gender, starting point or background – will have the opportunity to engage with a highquality geography education. They will be equipped with the knowledge, skills and vocabulary to understand about diverse places, people, resources and natural and human environments. Together with a deep understanding of the earth's key physical and human processes, we will provide children with explanations of how the earth's features are shaped over time. We intend to inspire a sense of enjoyment and curiosity about geography.



#### New Knowledge:

- London was founded by the Romans shortly after their invasion of Britain in AD43. London's geography made it an ideal location for a settlement. The River Thames provided a water supply for drinking, cooking, washing and watering animals, and was also deep and wide enough for a port to be established and for sea bound vessels to pass through, enabling imports and exports to be traded with other countries. Its location on the floodplain of the Thames also meant that soils were fertile for farming, and that the land here was relatively flat.
- One of the first things the Romans did was to bridge the Thames, linking areas to the north and south of the river, again for trade and communications. The site also provided good features for defence: the meander in the River Thames for visibility and to slow down potential invaders and the surrounding relief (the North and South Downs), which also provided some shelter.
- Since the city was founded by the Romans, people have migrated here as settlers, invaders, economic migrants seeking a better quality of life, or refugees fleeing war or persecution. Immigrants have influenced the geography, economy, landscape and culture of London.
- London is Europe's largest city.
- London has a population of approximately 9 million people.
- London is the capital city of England and of the United Kingdom.
- Greater London is divided into 32 boroughs.
- Twelve of the boroughs (plus the City of London) are classified as Inner London, including The City of Westminster.
- London is one of the world's most ethnically diverse cities in the world, and is the most ethnically diverse area in England and Wales.
  London is the fifth richest city in the world. There are extremes of wealth and of poverty in London. With people from Black and Ethnic Minority backgrounds are more likely to be in poverty.
- More than two-thirds (68%) of all homeless people living in temporary accommodation are in London (1 every 52 people in the capital).
- Some of the issues facing London and Londoners include: housing shortages, transport overcrowding and air pollution.
- The Thames is the longest river in England. It is 215 miles from source to mouth.

### London and The British Monarchy

#### New Knowledge:

- The Romans settled on the current site of London, due to the River Thames.
- London was called Londinium in 47AD.
- The Romans settled in the meaner of the river, so they could farm and so they were protected by invaders.
- Prior to any homeland Monarchy in Britain, England was part of the Roman Empire as a Roman colony.
- After around 410 AD, Roman rule in Britain had ended. True Monarchy in Britain began with the Anglo-Saxon conquest of England.
- Monarchy is the oldest form of government in the United Kingdom.
- In a monarchy, a king or queen is Head of State. The British Monarchy is currently known as a constitutional monarchy. This means that, while The Sovereign is Head of State, the ability to make and pass legislation resides with an elected Parliament.
- As Head of State, The Monarch undertakes state duties which have developed over one thousand years of history.
- The Sovereign acts as a focus for national identity, unity and pride; gives a sense of stability and continuity; officially recognises success and excellence; and supports the ideal of voluntary service.
- Her Majesty the Queen (Queen Elizabeth II) has ruled for longer than any other Monarch in British history, becoming a much loved and respected figure across the globe.
- Previously, the longest reigning monarch was Queen Victoria, who reigned for 63 years.
- Queen Elizabeth II is the great, great grandchild of Queen Victoria.
- HRH Queen Elizabeth II has many official royal residences throughout the UK, e.g. Buckingham Palace & Windsor Castle.
